Dear Parents/Carers,

Class News!

Nursery

This week in Nursery we have been looking at the story 'Supertato' by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet. We came into Nursery and found some special visitors in our classroom; some vegetables were trying to escape from Evil Pea so they came and hid with us! We helped Supertato by rounding the vegetables up from around the room and have looked after them ever since. We have ordered parts of the Supertato story and have thought about what some of the vegetables in the story would be saying in some of the illustrations. We have captured Evil Pea's to help with our fine motor skills and made traps to catch the Evil Pea using junk materials. For National Poetry Day we worked together to learn the poem 'I Am Hungry' by Michael Rosen. It was so much fun acting out different parts and learning our very own line from the poem.

In maths we have been working with the Numicon to compare and order the shapes using words such as big, small, bigger and smaller. We have talked about shapes that would go in the middle and decided to call them medium size. We have also used our Numicon shapes to make pictures including butterflies and boats!



This week we have also been thinking more about autumn. We have made salt dough leaves, baked apple crumble, painted with conkers, made a conker slide and visited the wildlife garden where we found lots of signs of autumn including lots of leaves on the ground, some blackberries and even some plums!









Reception

We have been doing some exciting activities in Reception over the last two weeks. In Literacy, we have been reading and learning about the story 'Supertato' by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet. The evil pea character in the story gets up to all sorts of mischief. He has even been causing mischief in our classroom when we have not been at school. We created wanted posters and painted some pictures to stick around school to see if we could catch him. We also created our own superhero and talked about what superpowers they had.



We really enjoyed making step by step instructions on how to make an Autumn biscuit. We mixed the ingredients together, carefully rolled out the mixture and used Autumn leaf cutters to make shapes. Once the biscuits had cooled down we made some icing. They were delicious!







The children have thoroughly enjoyed 'Wheels to School Week'.



Year 1

Year one have been working very hard. They have been learning to solve a dilemma! The Bog Baby had returned home but left us a problem to solve. A woolly mammoth had been found in the bog and it was covered in mud. We discussed how we could wash a woolly mammoth and really enjoyed reading the story. We could recall how to write instructions and found out about time conjunctions and how to use them in our writing.



In Mathematics we have been ordering objects, ordering numbers and using a number line. We have just started finding out about how to use the part whole model and have done lots of practical mathematics using this.

We are still enjoying finding out about Mary Anning and have been completing an information sheet all about her.

In science we enjoyed finding out about carnivores, omnivores and herbivores. We were brilliant at sorting dinosaurs into the correct group.

The children have enjoyed riding their bikes and scooters all week and were all very careful.









Year 2 have had a fantastic couple of weeks! In English, we have finished our unit of work on 'Meerkat Mail'. Children have LOVED this book and it has been great to see them so engaged. We have written setting descriptions and a diary entry for Sunny using our knowledge of time conjunctions and expanded noun phrases to write some wonderful sentences. We have also started our film study 'Adventures are the pits'. We have used our reading detective skills again to infer and predict what the film will be about.



In maths, Year 2 have been recapping our Year 1 knowledge of number bonds to 10. We have used this knowledge to help us derive number bonds to 100. We have been using tens and ones' frames to represent our bonds and identify links and patterns between number facts to 10, 20 and 100. We have been using new mathematical language 'inverse operation' and have been putting it into practise to create fact families and to check our answers.



In history, we have continued to learn about the Great Fire of London. We have been comparing current day London to what life looked like in London in the past- 1666. In science, we have been looking at healthy lifestyles and what makes a balanced diet.



What a brilliant day we have had today celebrating Times Tables Rockstar! Thank you for all your support at home with TTRS this week.



The children have been working scientifically in Science investigation different forces. They have carried out a friction investigation to see which materials have the most friction.

We have also looked at non contact forces and have started investigating magnetism. The children enjoy exploring different magnets and used bar magnets to answer the question: Can magnetism pass through all materials?

In English the children have been writing persuasive letters to the King and have written brilliant newspaper articles about the king banning the dark.

Maths this week we have moved onto column subtraction in 2 and 3-digit numbers. We are now practising exchanging numbers in column subtraction and borrowing from the next column.







Year 4

We've been working extremely hard over the last two weeks. In English, we wrote some fabulous Viking stories complete with not only blood and gore, but prefixes, suffixes, fronted adverbial phrases and some wonderful rich and varied vocabulary. Hopefully, once they have been typed up on the laptops, we'll have a few examples on the website. In Maths, we conquered fractions of amounts of money; again we had some truly bright sparks that were finding fractions of millions of pounds! I do have to say though; I have been super impressed with the determination of all of the children to be able to master this tricky concept. In Science, the circuits were out again; this time testing whether materials were conductors or insulators. In RE, we have looked at the story of Cain and Abel and produced some fabulous newspaper reports. In our topic work, we have covered history this week and learnt all about the day the Vikings invaded Lindisfarne! The children took on the role of a Viking and wrote some very graphic diary entries of what they did - 'slaughter' was mentioned guite a lot! In PE with had a game of target focussing on throwing, catching and trying to be in the correct position on the pitch. We have all really enjoyed the wheels to school week; every type of wheel could be seen on the playground. A fabulous end to the week as we all dressed as Rockstars and challenged ourselves to improving our times table knowledge.





Year 5

In year 5, we have packed a lot into the last fortnight! We had a great time on our trip to Jarrow Hall, despite the torrential rain, putting ourselves in the place of Saxons and exploring the replica Saxon village. We particularly enjoyed being told stories and riddles around the fire, and learning about armour and weapons. We were even allowed to battle each other! We really impressed Catherine at Jarrow Hall with our knowledge of the Beowulf story, which we have recently finished reading in English lessons.



Our computing work has led to lots of useful discussions about what sort of information is and isn't safe to put online, and how to look out for 'phishing' scams. We are also excited about how close many of us are getting to playing a proper tune in our brass sessions. We will sound fantastic by the end of term!



We have moved our focus in maths, using our place value understanding to help us use formal methods for adding and sub tracting. We are very proud that we can remember a lot of this so well from year 4!

In art, we were really pleased with how our Saxon style illuminated letters turned out. We etched our designs onto tin foil and created bright colours using Sharpie pens.

Cookery Club

Week 3 had a class of very busy cooks chopping and mixing. Sharp knives were at the ready to chop a range of crudités (raw veg to me and you) then two dips were prepared. Garlic and herb dip being the firm favourite with the children and a spiced yoghurt, coriander and mango chutney dip; hopefully some of the parents enjoyed that one as the faces pulled by the children showed a different picture!

Week 4 and we were back to a pudding! This time, lemon syllabub; minus the white wine, was prepared with lots of whisking and folding. This was served with microwaveable cinnamon biscuits; half of which needed to be cooked at home as we ran out of time. All I could see was a lot of sticky fingers and a classroom that looked like a bomb site! The end result, although rather messy, still looked delicious. Let's hope the final week for this first group of budding cooks will be met with happiness!
