

Stick this side to your book.

Openings in the hull, which allow the ships cannons to fire outside.	Rigging
Basket or barrel, lashed to the top of the tallest mast, to give a view of approaching land or a ship-to-ship battle.	Jolly Roger
The watertight body of a sailing ship.	bow
The system of ropes and cables which support the ships masts and are used to control the sails.	crow's nest
The most forward part of the boat, when it is moving forwards.	gun ports
Sheets of cotton canvas which use the power of the wind to drive ships forward.	hull
Flag flown to identify a pirate ship. Often, but not always, a skull and crossbones and sometimes coloured red to show that no prisoners would be taken.	sails
